

The season of Lent begins this year on Ash Wednesday, March 5, 2025, and concludes when the Paschal Triduum of the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of the Lord begins at the start of the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, April 17, 2025. The following practices and regulations are promulgated and binding for all Latin Rite Catholics in the Diocese of Erie for Lent and the Paschal Triduum, 2025. Eastern Rite Catholics who may be attending Latin Rite parishes have their own proper regulations and should consult their own eparchy or parish.

- 1. Traditional Lenten practices of PRAYER, FASTING, and ALSMGIVING, and other forms of self-denial, are recommended most warmly by the Church. Daily Mass is particularly encouraged.
- 2. ASH WEDNESDAY, ALL FRIDAYS IN LENT, and GOOD FRIDAY are days of abstinence from eating meat for those 14 years of age and older.
- 3. ASH WEDNESDAY AND GOOD FRIDAY are also days of fasting for those ages 18 to 58 inclusive. (On these days, those bound by the law of fasting may take one full meal. Two smaller meals, sufficient to maintain strength according to one's needs, are also permitted. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids including milk and fruit juices are allowed. When health or work is seriously affected, the law does not oblige.)
- 4. On HOLY THURSDAY, no celebration of the Mass is to begin anywhere in the diocese earlier than 4:30 pm without the explicit approval of Bishop Persico.
- 5. Although it does not include the Liturgy of the Eucharist, by its very nature the GOOD FRIDAY service is celebrated by a priest only.
- 6. All celebrations of the EASTER VIGIL are to begin after nightfall (which is defined as approximately one hour after local sunset.) Nightfall is about 9:00 pm this year. To balance pastoral need and liturgical prescriptions, Bishop Persico has decreed that the Easter Vigil in the Diocese of Erie is to begin at 8:30 pm or any later time. Any start time earlier than 8:30 pm must receive explicit approval from the Bishop.

Operation Rice Bowl is a project sponsored by Catholic Relief Services. CRS is a Catholic developmental



organization assisting the poorest and most desperate of our brothers and sisters around the world. Through Operation Rice Bowl, we are given an opportunity to share our abundant blessings with those in need.

Rice Bowl cardboard banks and family calendars will be distributed to all of the children enrolled in our Rel. Ed. Program. Additional Rice Bowls and calendars will be available for families not connected with Rel. Ed.

The calendars offer excellent suggestions for keeping the needs of others before us during Lent. Information on the causes of hunger and poverty in various regions of the globe are given in a way that is easy for all to understand.

As we give up luxuries such as chocolate or eat a simple meal once a week, we are invited to place the money we save into the Rice Bowl bank. In this way, our acts of self-sacrifice are not tests of our self-will, but opportunities to help others. The money in each bank is turned in to the Rel. Ed. Office during the Easter season. From there, it is mailed to Catholic Relief Services to help the hungry and homeless, those without access to education or medical care, around the world.

## Baptismal Preparation Session

To hold your child for the first time is one of the most holy moments in a parent's life. No one can deny the awe and gratitude that fills the heart when a parent gazes on this miracle. We know that we have been entrusted with a sacred duty, to protect and guide this gift of God into adulthood.

To hold your child who is newly born in the waters of baptism is a profoundly holy moment. God has given you this treasure and you surrender him or her back to

Is there a more incredible responsibility then to shepherd this child into the life of a disciple, to enable them to rise with Christ, to become a member of the Body of Christ? Recognizing the gift and responsibility of bringing a child to the font, the Church asks that all parents attend a Parent Baptismal Preparational Session prior to scheduling their child's baptism.

The next session held at OLM will take place on Sunday, March 30 @ 10:30 am.



#### Until You Come Again: Reflections on the Last Things

A summary of the Church's teaching on the Second Coming of Christ and the Teaching on Heaven, Hell and Purgatory. What does the Church believe and how do we carry this out in life and worship?

He worked in seminary formation at St. Mark Seminary until 2022 and currently is in residence at St. Peter Cathedral. In addition to his pastoral ministry to the Gannon community and at the Cathedral parish, he teaches courses in philosophy, theology, and foreign language.

Around the globe and across the centuries, people have reported appearances by the Virgin Mary. Marian apparitions have led to conversions to Catholicism, a spread of devotions to Mary, and worldwide trips by millions of pilgrims to holy sites. The Vatican has specific regulations for investigating the Marian Apparitions, and only 16 have been deemed "worthy of belief".

Fr. Renne will explore celebrated Marian appearances, focusing on Lourdes, Fatima, and Guadalupe. He will explain the process the church undergoes when evaluating Marian apparitions.

Fr. David Renne is a native of Punxsutawney, PA. He was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Erie in 2013 by Bishop Persico. After serving four years as a parochial vicar at Our Lady of Peace Parish in Erie, he was assigned to The Catholic University of America in Washington, DC for doctoral studies. He defended his doctoral dissertation in 2022 on the use of technology in the liturgy. He currently serves as the vice-rector of St. Mark Seminary. He is an instructor of theology at Gannon University, and serves as the director of continuing clergy formation for the Diocese of Erie.

Small Christian Communities

Lent is a season of renewal, of making new what we hold closest to our hearts. Small faith sharing groups are the perfect way to renew our spiritual lives, to challenge ourselves to live a new our walk with Christ each day.

All are invited to try a Small Christian Community during the season of Lent. There are groups for every schedule: daytime and evening, all female and mixed groups, those that meet weekly and those that meet less frequently.

What is a Small Christian Community? A Small Christian Community is a group of parishioners who meet consistently to reflect together on the Sunday readings. Each gathering begins and ends with prayer. Believing that God's Word is alive and deeply personal, participants allow the Scripture to speak to their hearts. The shared insights of each member help the others to grow in their understanding of what God is saying. As the

members share their reflections on the biblical passage, they also share their lives, their hopes and dreams, their joys and sorrows and become the hands and voice of Christ to each other.

In addition to his academic work, Christopher served as a technical committee member and reviewer for several international conferences and as an assistant editor for the Cybersecurity Skills Journal. He is also a member of the Association for Computing Machinery (ACM) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE).
